9 Cars of Crack C.N.R. Train Derailed; 11 People Hurt

Hon. Hugh Guthrie Escapes Injury When Private Car Off Track

QUEBEC, Aug. 17 (CP).—Derailed nine cars of the Ocean Limited, crash Halifax-Montreal express train, at La Verendrye 18 miles east of Levis, early today, caused slight injuries to eleven passengers, Canadian National Railways officials announced.

None of the derailed cars overturned in the early morning mishap and the train proceeded to Montreal after the cars had been returned to the rails with the aid of a wrecking train. Cause of the derailment remained unknown.

Doctors from La Verendrye treated the victims, none of whom required hospital treatment. Bruised and shaken up were Marie Anne Lavigne, W. Summers, Mrs. Louis Roy, all of Quebec; Mrs. R. H. Jones and infant, Montreal; Emile Belanger, Drummondville, Que.; Ephraim Beaudoin, St. Denis, Que.; Napoleon Cote and Miss Matilda Gagnon, St. Madard, Que.; Roland Croteau Warwick, Que.; and Omer Turcot, Val D'Espoir, Gaspé, Que.
