Mr. E. Giffen, of Victoria, has been ap-
pointed toll collector at Telegraph Creek,
in place of the late Mr. Jenkinson, mur-

A farmer named Matter, of Keppel, re-
turning from Owen Sound was robbed of
\$22, the price of a load of barley. He was
also brutally beaten by the robbers.

A Windsor cricket team went to Norwalk,
Ohio, and beat an eleven of that place in
one innings with 87 runs to spare. The
Norwalkers made but 29 and 13 in their
first and second innings.

The counties of Frontenac, Lennox, and
Addington have been grouped for judicial
purposes, and a proclamation will be issued
immediately to make the change take effect
on the 1st November.

Notwithstanding that rains caused much
damage the crop yield in British Columbia
is fully as large as in former years. As a
rule spring wheat proved superior to the
fall grain, as last winter was unusually
wet. Root crops have turned out well.

Arrangements have been made whereby
regular passenger trains will hereafter be
run on the Grand Junction and Belleville
and North Hastings Railways. Mr. R. Lut-
trell, an experienced and able railroad man-
ager, has been appointed General Superin-
tendent of both roads. Freight trains will
be run as business requires.

The work of strengthening the T.
G. & B. Railway bridge at Mount
Forest is going on. A filling, es-
timated at about ten thousand cubic
yards, is being made around the piles and
lower timbers of the bridge, a number of
new needle beams will be placed under the
track, and other necessary repairs will be
made in the superstructure.

Phil. Ripper, an old prospector, has been
working the Leech River section lately.
From it he brought specimens of rock said
to be silver bearing from a seven foot ledge
in Deception Gulch, and a few grains of
rusty gold taken from a twenty-five foot
tunnel which he ran into the bench at hill-
side of Wolf Creek. The specimens are in-
teresting, and would appear to support the
theory of old miners that "some day on
another Leech River would astonish the
world."

Gold has been discovered in a creek
situated about five miles above the mouth
of Harrison River, and from its running
due north it has been named North Creek.
A correspondent of the *Mainland Guardian*
who recently visited it says:—I prospected
all the way up and found gold everywhere;
in one pan I got about thirteen colours.
The gold is fine, but I could pick it out

Completion of the Official Inspection of the Line. *Nov 1 1879*

MOUNT FOREST, Oct. 30.—Col. Gzowski, of Toronto, and Mr. Walter Shanly, of Montreal, accompanied by Messrs. Wragge and Dickey, passed through here to-day. After having inspected the large railway bridge here, they proceeded to Harriston and Teeswater to complete their professional investigation of the works of the Toronto, Grey, and Bruce Railway.

TEESWATER, Oct. 30.—It appears that the Directors of the Toronto, Grey, and Bruce Railway have at last set to work energetically to bring about the proposed change of gauge and improvements to the line. To-day Col. Gzowski, of Toronto, and Mr. Walter Shanly, of Montreal, arrived here, after having made a careful and thorough inspection of the whole line from Toronto to Owen Sound, and from Orangeville to this village. They expressed themselves as greatly astonished at the wonderful improvements which have taken place in this section of the Province since the building of the road, and pleased at the exceeding fertility of the country. It is their intention to report fully as to the condition of the whole line, and to advise as to the widening of the gauge and the correctness of the figures submitted by the Company's Chief Engineer as to the cost of contemplated improvements, and generally to advise the Directors.
