CHICAGO-MONTREAL EXPRESS WRECKED NEAR LONDON, ONT.

London, Ont., February 8.—The C. P. R. Chicago-Montreal express, No. 18, in charge of Engineer George Dowling, of London, was wrecked at Newbury at 3.55 o'clock this morning.

The big Mogul engine and entire train of ten coaches are in a ditch.

Express Messenger Michael Berry, of Toronto, and Henry Huggitt, of Bala Muskoka, were seriously hurt by being hurled against the sides of the car.

A large number of passengers were seriously shaken up.

The train was heading at high speed for London, and as soon as the engine struck the switch, it jumped off the rails, pounded over the ties for a hundred yards, all the coaches following.

A special hospital train has been rushed from London.
