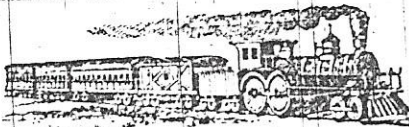

W., had an interview with the Finance and Railway Committee of the City Council, and Mr. Stuart explained to the committee the reason why it was advantageous to the city's interest as stockholders in the road that the bill should pass. Other members of the railway deputation also spoke briefly upon the subject, several of the committee catechizing them pretty thoroughly.

On request Mr. Stuart promised to put in writing the information laid before the committee, and also to prepare a memorandum setting forth the company's plan, to accompany the committee's report to the Council. In the meantime the directors of the company agree to arrange that the bill shall not come before the Railway committee of the Legislature until the City Council has had an opportunity of considering the statement and memorandum to be furnished by the company.
