Dr. Carnon, associate coroner, held an loquest on the body of a colored woman, name unknown, at Spurzill's botel, on Thursday lest. From the evidence given before the Coroner's jury, it appears that the poor woman was found mear Homer's Corners, frozen and speechless, by Mr. D. Campbell, County constable, between 11 and 12 o'clock on Wednesday night; that being unable to procure a herse, he placed her in a cutter, and with assistance of another man, pulled the cutter all the way to the gaol, where he made the condition of the woman known, but the gaoler refused to keep her without a committal; thence he took her to the lock-up, where she was also refused admission, there being no accommodation provided at that place. More than an hour's time was occupied in this manner.
