## e Passengers Hurt n As Coaches Roll n Over Embankment

Train Hits Broken Rail,  
Cars Go Down 75-  
Foot Slope

12 SLIGHTLY INJURED

Derailment Near Hawkes-  
bury Occurs Perilously  
Near Bridge

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Hawkesbury, Jan. 8. — Three pas-  
senger cars of a Canadian Pacific  
Railway train rolled down a 75-foot  
embankment, between Calumet, Que.,  
and Pointe aux Chenes, this after-  
noon, causing minor injuries to 12  
persons, who were brought to Hawkes-  
bury hospital for treatment.

Heading for Montreal, the Monte-  
bello train ran into a broken rail just  
before reaching a bridge over the  
Rouge River. While the locomotive,  
tender and baggage car of the train  
remained on the track, the three pas-  
senger cars, containing 17 persons,  
rolled down the bank and were wreck-  
ed on trees and rocks. The cars were  
reported as having turned over two  
or three times in the fall.

All 17 persons were shaken up and  
more or less bruised, 12 of them be-  
ing brought here for observation.

Six children of Mrs. Emile Gas-  
con, aged 26, of Verdun, Montreal,  
and their mother, were among those  
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Miss Denise Jette, 18, of St. Hy-  
acinthe, Que., broken arm and bruises;  
Mr. and Mrs. Lucien Thomas, Mon-  
treal, shock; Josephat Jette, St. Hy-  
acinthe, and Alphonse Gibeault,  
Hawkesbury.

Doctors stated all injuries were  
superficial, and not more than five  
of the injured were expected to stay  
in hospital overnight.
